



How could we forget about "America's Pastime" in our last edition of the Hometown News? We focused on all of the wonderful sporting activities available to our residents, young and old, but somehow missed our wonderful little league group, the Greater Northeast Little League (GNELL) who meet at Live Oak Park. As we gear up for the Fall Classic, what better time to correct our errors and feature the Little League group we are so proud of? We hope that this article keeps us from being "ejected" from the printing business.

The Greater Northeast Little League was formed in 1962 as Converse Little League before moving to the Randolph area in 2006. After additional transformation, the group merged with the Kirby Little League in 2008 and became known by their current association name, the Greater Northeast Little League (GNELL).

GNELL is a non-profit organization open to children (boys and girls) from ages 4-18, regardless of ability or talent. They are dedicated to helping the growth of the youth within their organization and the coaches must recognize that they hold a position of trust and responsibility in the program. Each coach is required to have an understanding of patience and the ability to work well with children. Above all, these coaches and managers play a major role in helping to shape the physical, mental and emotional development of young people.

Little League is a completely volunteer organization that is supported by 15 board members. The organization has grown in popularity over the years and in 2012, GNELL had a roster of 382 players and 105 managers, making it one of their most successful seasons. They have received much success in the past, advancing to the Softball World Series in 2001, and more


recently, their senior players advanced to the Section 3 tournament in 2011.

For those interested in spring ball, registration will take place on Saturdays in January at the concession stand at Live Oak Park. The exact dates and times will be posted on their website at www. gnell.org. For convenience, you can also register online.

The registration fee for spring is \$70 for ages 4-6 and \$90 for ages 7-14. There is a mandatory fundraiser for the spring season as well. The registration fee for the fall is \$55 regardless of age. Games for the spring season are held in Kirby and Live Oak, fall season games are in Kirby only.

A woman by the name of Doc Anderson was known as The Donkey Lady. She was an eccentric animal lover and owned a number of rare donkeys and horses. She ran "Doc's Little Dude Ranch" where people would come to ride her horses. Doc was also known for being able to handle skunks without getting sprayed.

Doc was forced to move from her property and set up a squatter's shack in a wooded area off Weidner Rd. She was well into her 60's by this time. She was described as a frail, ghostly figure who wore a bonnet. She had one arm, cold dark eyes and wore bright red lipstick. She spent what little money she had on food for the animals. Live Oak residents would see her eerie figure emerge from the woods with a string of six After a short stay there, Doc relocated to another area known as Robards, where by all accounts, she still haunts to this day. It is where the Woodcrest subdivision is currently located. It had been an area that was plagued by thugs and criminals for many years. The City of Live Oak's records state there was a band of "Okies" living in the woods, and there is even a story of two people that were murdered there. Kids from the area would sneak into the woods at night, set fires and torment her and her animals. Her prize horse and life-long companion, Mohawk, reportedly was shot through the neck with an arrow and was killed. Kids would continue to enter the woods at night and harass Doc and her animals to the point where her chilling screams could be heard by residents who lived near the wooded area.

After being evicted and led away from the Woodcrest area for the very last time, Doc was very old nursing home, with no mention of where her donkeys, horses or any of her property ended up.

The stories of Doc and all the harassment and torment she endured through the years would all be unpardonable and worth someone's soul not being able to rest. For those of you Trick-or-Treating near the Woodcrest area this Halloween. listen for the cries and screams of an old woman and the braying of her donkeys. Please BEWARE....the donkey lady might be coming back for her revenge this Hallows' Eve.


Halloween SAFETY TIPS

Well, it's that time of the year again. Halloween is just around the corner. It seems that it was just a couple of months ago that we had the streets of Live Oak crawling with all kinds of creatures, goblins and ghosts. There were even Super Heroes out to keep us all safe. My personal favorite was the few little Police Officers that were out.

The members of the Live Oak Police Department would like to remind everyone of some important safety tips. First, did you know that on average children are twice more likely to be hit by a car on Halloween than on any other day of the vear? It can sometimes be difficult to see pedestrians in the twilight hours. Kids will be kids and in the excitement they do not always look before crossing streets. Drivers need to be reminded to pay extra attention for pedestrians.

Parents, when selecting a costume make sure it is the right size to prevent trips and falls. Decorate costumes and bags with reflective tape or stickers and if possible, choose light colors. Remember that masks can sometimes obstruct your child's vision; try non-toxic face paint and/or makeup whenever possible.

Have your children use glow sticks or flashlights to help them see and be seen by drivers. Younger children should not be alone at night without adult supervision. If



Parents should remind children not to eat any of the treats they get until it has been inspected. Please look over the treats your children receive and discard anything that looks to be suspicious or has a wrapping that is open or torn.

Fire Prevention Week

Live Oak's Fire Department is teaming up with the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) during Fire Prevention week, October 6 – 12, 2013. This year's theme is "Prevent Kitchen Fires". The kitchen is often at the very center of life, but leave cooking unattended in the kitchen and you could have a serious fire on your hands.

Cooking equipment is involved in roughly 150,000 home fires per year, and many of those fires start because people aren't paying attention. While a few minutes may not seem like much time to be away from what's cooking, that's all it takes to start a fire that could destroy your home and harm your family.

Our goal is to help teach kids about fire safety in the kitchen and home. We want to give the information necessary on how to prevent fires as well as what to do in case of a fire. By teaching our kids about fire safety, the knowledge could very well save their lives.

Kitchen Safety

Checklist:

Does a grown-up always pay attention to things that are cooking?

Does a grown-up watch the stovetop while frying, grilling, or broiling food?

If a grown-up must leave the kitchen for even a short period of time, do they turn off the stove?

Are things that can burn, dish towels, curtains, or paper at least 3 feet away from the stove?

Is the top of the stove clean? No spilled food, grease, paper or bags? Are pot handles turned in towards the back of the stove when a grown-up is cooking?

Do children and pets stay out of the "kid-free" zone (3 feet from the stove) when a grown-up is cooking?

Are containers opened slowly after they are removed from the microwave, as hot steam escaping from the container can cause painful burns?

Is the fire department's emergency number near the phone?

Does your family have working smoke alarms and a home fire escape plan?



NATIONAL PREPAREDNESS MONTH

The month of September has once again been designated National Preparedness Month by the Department of Homeland Security and the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

All citizens should be aware of the potential hazards facing our community and then have a family disaster plan just in case a serious emergency should ever occur.

Generally speaking weather is our biggest threat! Severe thunderstorms with large hail, dangerous lightning, high winds, and even tornadoes can occur. The best defense against severe weather is with a NOAA weather radio, available at most electronic stores. These are especially useful during the nighttime when no one is watching TV or listening to the radio.

A family disaster plan should include a safe area in your home in the event of a tornado; basic supplies like flashlights, a battery powered radio, and a first aid kit. In the event of an evacuation, where would you go and what would you take with you on very short notice? Finally if you have pets, you need to plan for their safety as well.

In addition, you can visit the Emergency Management Section of the City Web Site or stop by the Office of Emergency Management, located in the Fire Station, during normal business hours.



- 1 pkg. chocolate or yellow cake mix
- 1 stick butter or margarine (softened)
- 2 eggs

Mix all ingredients together. Drop by teaspoonfuls on ungreased cookie sheet. Bake at 350° for 8-10 minutes and cool. Dye white or cream cheese icing orange and spread in between two cookies. Roll edges in Halloween colored sprinkles. For Halloween Kiss Cookies, use a yellow cake mix and dye orange. Follow same recipe. Place one Hershey Kiss on top of cookie right after they are removed from oven.



Pumpkin Cheese Ball

- 2 (8-ounce) blocks shredded Cheddar Cheese
- 2 tsp. paprika
- 1 (8-ounce) package cream cheese,
 softened
- ½ tsp. cayenne pepper
- 1 (8-ounce) container chive & onion cream cheese
 - ½ tsp. garlic salt
 - 1 broccoli stalk (for pumpkin stem)

Combine cheddar cheese and all ingredients and mix until blended. Cover and chill 4 hours or until mixture is firm. Shape mixture into a ball to resemble a pumpkin using a knife to make vertical grooves. Cut broccoli stalk and press into top of cheese ball.

Candy Corn-Marshmallow Crispy Treats

- 1/4 cup butter
- · 6 cups mini marshmallows
- 12 drops yellow food coloring
- 4 drops red food coloring
- 6 cups crisp rice cereal
- 2 cups candy corn

Microwave butter in large microwaveable bowl on High 45 sec. or until melted. Add marshmallows; toss to coat. Microwave 1 ½ min. or until marshmallows are completely melted and mixture is well blended, stirring in food coloring after 45 seconds. Add cereal and candy corn; mix well. Press onto bottom of 13x9 pan sprayed with cooking spray. Cool and cut into desired shapes.
