

So many times animals are left to roam the streets, dirty, hungry and unloved and uncared for. Here at the city's Animal Control Facility, our goal is to find forever homes for each and every one of these sweet animals. Below you will find what makes our job here so satisfying and heartwarming.



OLIVER VON WIGGLEBUTT

Charlie came into our facility last year back in February and we had him for almost a month. Typically white Boxers are born with some kind of defect. In Charlie's case he was born deaf, which would explain why no one came in for him. We reached out to an organization called Austin Boxer Rescue (ABR) where he was given the name Oliver Von Wigglebutt!! He is now a Service Dog for a little boy and his family!







Creole also known as the "Springs Dog" finally came to Animal Control after almost a month of eluding Animal Control. Creole was a stray that was hanging around The Springs at Live Oak apartments. Creole was very shy and would not come to anyone including the residents. Animal Control set humane traps and were finally able to catch her late one evening. She was brought into Animal Control where she very frightened. The next day the Animal Control Officer was able to get in her kennel and sit down with the dog. Before long Creole was on her back wanting a belly rub. Animal Control was able to arrange for Creole to be transferred to South Texas Aussie Rescue. She was then transported to Houston. She was quickly adopted by a family that recently had lost their Aussie. Creole currently resides in Louisiana with her forever family.

Bruce was a stray dog we picked from the field off of Cranbrook in October 2014. We reached out to several different rescues to try and get him adopted. Bruce is a dog full of energy and love. 

BE WISE AROUND WATER

very summer, families flock to local swimming pools, vacation at beaches and spend weekends at the lake. Even if you don't leave home, a backyard swimming pool can be potentially fatal to persons of all ages. Here at the City of Live Oak community swimming pool, the lifeguards stand ready and alert to assist in water safety and rescue. If you will be venturing out to other sources of water, please make note of the following safety tips. As always, remember your sunscreen! Even a mild sunburn can turn a fun day into a very painful experience, as well as create lifelong complications.

If you are going to be visiting a beach this summer, the American Red Cross has a few safety reminders.

• Have young children and inexperienced Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has speswimmers wear a US Coast Guard ap-

proved life jacket in and around the water. No one should use any other type of flotation device unless they are able to swim.

- Don't dive headfirst-protect your neck. Check for depth and obstructions before • diving, and go in feet first the first time.
- Pay especially close attention to children and elderly persons when at the beach. • Even in shallow water, wave action can cause a loss of footing.
- While you're enjoying the water, keep alert and check the local weather conditions. Make sure you swim sober and that you never swim alone. And even if you're confident in your swimming skills, make sure you have enough energy to swim back to the shore.

life jackets. Below are two very important rules to remember, not just in the summer but year

- All children under 13 years of age must be wearing a US Coast Guard approved life jacket in or on vessels under 26 feet.
- All vessels including canoes and kayaks must be equipped with one wearable Personal Flotation Device (PFD) for each person on board.

The CDC states that drowning ranks 5th among leading causes of unintentional injury death in the United States, with 80% of people who die from drowning being male. Children ages 1-4 have the highest drowning rates. Research has found that taking formal swimming lessons and wearing life jackets will reduce the risk of drowning.



Reduce Storm Water Pollution

Everyone can help to reduce pollution levels in our creeks and streams. Here is a tip that you can use for Lawn Care. Excess fertilizers and pesticides applied to lawns and gardens wash off and pollute streams. In addition, yard clippings and leaves can wash into storm drains and contribute nutrients and organic matter to streams.

- Use pesticides and fertilizers sparingly. When use is necessary, use these chemicals in the recommended amounts.
 Use organic mulch or safer pest control methods whenever possible.
- Compost or mulch yard waste. Don't leave it in the street or sweep it into storm drains or streams.







Outdoor Water Saving Tips

Here are some great outdoor water saving tips to help you conserve water and lower your water bill:

- Water only when needed. Look at the grass, feel the soil, or use a soil moisture meter to determine when to water.
- Do not over-water. Water needs vary greatly by season, grass species and amount of shade, so keeping the same settings year-round will result in over-watering. As a general rule, three-fourths of an inch of water per week on St. Augustine or Zoysia grasses that are in full sun is sufficient for the summer. In the shade, these species only need one-half of an inch of water per week. Bermuda grass and Buffalo grass, both of which can only grow in full sun, require one-half of an inch per week. In the fall, spring and winter, these recommendations can be reduced or eliminated, depending on the weather.
- Water lawns early in the morning during the hotter summer months. Otherwise, much of the water used can simply evaporate.



• To avoid excessive evaporation, use a sprinkler that produces large drops of water, rather than a fine mist. Sprinklers that send droplets out on a low angle also help control evaporation.

- Set automatic sprinkler systems to provide thorough but infrequent watering. Rain shut-off devices can prevent watering in the rain.
- Use drip-irrigation systems for bedded plants, trees and shrubs, or turn the flat, green soaking hoses upside down so the holes are on the bottom. This will help prevent evaporation.
- Be careful not to water the streets, sidewalks or driveways.

RESTAURANT ESTABLISHMENT INSPECTIONS

The growing city of Live Oak contracts with Bureau Veritas North America Inc. to conduct the health inspections of 82 food establishments. Food establishments within the municipality of Live Oak are inspected twice a year. If unable to be inspected at this frequency, then inspections are prioritized by risk along with any complaints received throughout the year. Each year the establishments are required to renew their Food Establishment Permits and all food handlers employed by the establishment must have a completion certificate from a Texas Certified Food Safety Course on file with management.

WHAT OUR SCORES MEAN

Our establishments include a wide variety of food industries, such as restaurants, delicatessens, school cafeterias, Daycare Facilities, Fitness Centers, Hotels, Theater concessions, convenient stores, Farmers markets, bakeries and bars. If no violations are found a score of 100 is achieved. If more than 30 points are lost, a re-inspection is required and corrections must be made to bring the score above 70, in accordance with the State Health and Live Oak Sanitation Codes. If subsequent inspections score below 70, compliance actions will be taken (see sample below).

IMPORTANT NOTICE ABOUT RESTAURANT SCORE INFORMATION

The inspection scores are designed to

give consumers an indication of a food establishment's sanitation level during an inspection performed by our Health and Safety Program Manager from Bureau Veritas. The inspection results give consumers a "snap shot in time" of an establishment's sanitation and procedures. It should not be assumed that the inspection results reflect how an establishment always operates. Consumers may draw their own conclusions from their personal experiences to each of the establish-

While every effort is made to keep the information accurate and up to date within each facility, the City of Live Oak is not responsible for discrepancies between information recorded

in our in-house database and the inspection reports posted on food establishment premises. The patron must recognize that inspections are occurring continuously. As a result, scores provided may occasionally differ from the most current inspections. If you have a complaint against any of our establishments, the City provides a Health/Food Complaint form on the website for your convenience. The complaint will be handled promptly by an inspector within 24 hours of this department receiving the complaint form. A follow up report will be provided to the complainant as a courtesy. 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LIVE OAK FIRE DEPARTMENT

Attached Garage Fire Hazards

Garage fires are a present danger, particularly during the growing and mowing season. Our purpose with this article is to give you tips to help guard against a fire happening in your garage. Garage fires do happen, and we'd like you to make sure that a fire cannot easily spread to the rest of your home.

Why do many garages pose a fire hazard?

Where are you most likely to do any welding, or any work on your car? These activities require working with all sorts of flammable materials.

Water heaters and boilers are usually stored in garages, and they can create sparks that may ignite fumes or fluids. Car batteries, too, will spark under certain conditions.

Oil and gasoline can drip from cars. These fluids may collect unnoticed and eventually ignite, given the proper conditions.

Flammable liquids, such as gasoline, motor oil and paint are commonly stored in garages. Some other examples are brake fluid, varnish, paint thinner and lighter fluid.

Garage fires are a present danger, particularly during the growing and mowing season. **The following tips can help prevent garage fires and their spread:**

If the garage allows access to the attic, make sure a hatch covers this access.

The walls and ceiling should be fire-rated. Unfortunately, it will be difficult for untrained homeowners to tell if their walls are Type X fire-rated gypsum. A proper inspector can examine the walls and ceiling to make sure they are adequate fire barriers.

The floor should be clear of clutter. Loose papers, matches, oily rags, and other potentially flammable items are extremely dangerous if they are strewn about the garage floor.

Use light bulbs with the proper wattage, and do not overload electrical outlets.

Tape down all cords and wires so they are not twisted or accidentally yanked.

If there is a door that connects the garage to the living area, consider the following:

Do not install a pet door in the door! Flames can more easily spread into the living area through a pet door, especially if it's made of plastic.

Does the door have a window? Make sure the window is fire-rated.

The door should be self-closing. While it may be inconvenient, especially while carrying groceries into the house from the car, doors should be self-closing. You never know when a fire will happen, and it would be unfortunate to accidentally leave the door open while a fire is starting in the garage.

Check the joints and open spaces around the door. Are they tightly sealed? Any openings at all can allow dangerous fumes, such as carbon monoxide or gasoline vapor, to enter the living area.

Concerning items placed on the floor, you should check for the following:

Store your flammable liquids in clearly labeled, self-closing container, and only in small amounts. Keep them away from heaters, appliances, pilot lights and other sources of heat or flame.

Never store propane tanks indoors. If they catch fire, they can explode. Propane tanks are sturdy enough to be stored outdoors.

In closing, there are plenty of things that you can do to prevent garage fires from spreading to the rest of the house, or to keep them from starting in the first place.
