MAY 2012 ELECTION CHANGES

Citizens of Live Oak:

Senate Bill (S.B.) 100 was passed during the recently concluded 82nd Texas Legislative Session to address requirements under the federal Military and Overseas Voter Empowerment Act. S.B. 100 alters the primary election dates and could potentially impact our city elections.

The most important part of this change rests with Bexar County Election Department and their willingness to contract and supply our municipality with equipment and services. Jacque Callanen, Bexar County Election Administrator has agreed that she and her staff will support all the municipalities and other entities, but there will be a stipulation, which is due to equipment and manpower. The stipulation(s) is:

All municipalities, school districts, etc. can only use Bexar County Election Sites.

This means the City of Live Oak will not be able to use the Live Oak Civic Center as an Early Voting Site or as an Election Day Site. There are approximately 28 Bexar County Early Voting Sites and the closest early voting site for Live Oak residents will be Universal City (City Hall). However, due to the joint election residents would still be able to use the other 27 early voting sites. Our Election Day Sites will be Crestview and Ed Franz Elementary Schools.

As the Election process and guidelines are outlined, I will post all updates on our City website, www.liveoaktx.net

Soup's On!!

The next couple of months are going to be chilly! Here are some delicious soup recipes to warm you up. Courtesy of some of our wonderful staff here at the City of Live Oak!

ITALIAN TOMATO SOUP

Laureen Satabe, Receptionist

2 Tbsp. olive oil

1/4 cup uncooked rice

1 med. onion, chopped

1 cup diced canned tomatoes w/some juice

1 green pepper, chopped

4 cups chicken broth

1 large clove garlic, minced

1-2 oz. thinly sliced pepperoni

1 tsp. dried oregano

½ cup shredded Provolone cheese

2 tsp. dried basil

½ cup grated Parmesan cheese

1/4 tsp. crushed red pepper (opt.)

In a large, heavy saucepan, heat the olive oil and saute the onion and green pepper until softened. Stir in garlic and cook for a minute. Add the oregano, basil, crushed red pepper, rice, tomatoes and broth. Bring to a boil. Lower heat to a simmer and cover. Cook for 20 minutes or until rice is tender. Stir in the pepperoni and sprinkle with the cheese. Cook for another minute or two. Serve the soup with an extra sprinkle of Parmesan cheese if desired.



SANTA FE STEW

3 lbs. ground beef, cooked & drained

1 pkg. ranch dressing mix

1 pkg. taco seasoning mix

1 lb. Velveeta cheese

3 cans ranch style beans

3 cans of kidney beans

2 cans of pinto beands

2 cans of rotel

Simmer all ingredients until the cheese is melted. This makes a ton, but it freezes well.

CREAMY HOT AVACADO SOUP

2 Avocados 4 cups chicken stock 1 ¼ cups sour cream Cilantro or other garnish Serves 6 (1 cup servings)

In food processor or blender, blend avocados and a couple spoonfulls of the sour cream (add a small amount of chicken stock if too thick). Mix in food processor until smooth. Heat chicken stock in 2 quart saucepan until hot. Whisk in remaining sour cream, then whisk in avocado mixture. Heat only until hot. DO NOT BOIL. Top with cilantro or any of your favorite garnishes.

The Live Oak Police Department will be finishing up 2011 by sponsoring the annual Blue Santa Program, providing toys to the needy children within our community. MEET RACHEL KELLEY

Kindergarten Teacher, Ed Franz Elementary School

It's a rare occasion when a teacher decides to stay at one school for their entire career and teach the same grade. Ed Franz Elementary has one such teacher, Rachel Kelley. Rachel has been teaching school a total of 33 years, 29 spent here in Live Oak at Ed Franz Elementary teaching Kindergarten. "I love our school, the community, and the families in Live Oak. It is wonderful to see your students grow up and be happy, successful, and productive citizens," Rachel said.

About 10 years ago, Rachel began teaching the children of her former students. "It is such a blessing to have a history and a connection with these new students, parents and grandparents." Each year, Mrs. Kelley has at least two or three of these children in her class. One year she was fortunate to have five students in her class whose mothers she had taught! Many of those parents and grandparents volunteer in her classroom. She knows of at least eight of her ex-students who went on to become teachers. Three of the girls she taught are now Kindergarten teachers in Judson also. Many of her students have come back to visit at different stages in their lives, and many correspond or email her. She stated, "It is always wonderful to hear about their lives and accomplishments. Many are teachers, nurses, firefighters, police officers, computer specialists, military servicemen and women, and many other professions."

When asked what made her want to become a teacher, she replied, "I knew I wanted to be a teacher when I was 8 years old. My Mom went back to college to get her degree in Education when I was a young girl. Many times I would go to class with her and sit and listen or read. Later, when she was teaching, I would help her each year get ready for the first day of school. I am a third generation Kindergarten Teacher so I guess it was just natural." Her grandmother also had her own Kindergarten class in the back part of her home in Killeen, Texas where Rachel would often sit on her lap while she taught.

Another reason Rachel continues teaching here in Live Oak is the community. "It's not every school that has a fire department, police department, and City offices so close and active in helping out our students. When the Kindergarten classes walk to the park for different events, it is not uncommon to have a Live Oak Police Officer stop and help us cross the street. Our students love the poster contests sponsored by the City and the opportunities to visit the Fire Station, City offices, and City parks. The staff of our school truly appreciates the support." Although Mrs. Kelley has worked for several different administrators at Ed Franz Elementary and Judson ISD in the 29 years she has been at Ed Franz, she comments that the one thing that has not changed is that the staff still remains a family. "We work together to educate our students, support each other, and make our school the best it can be. It is a great place to work because of the people we work with and the children we teach. From our support staff to our administrators, we all work towards the same goal: the success and safety of our students."

When asked years from now, what do you think the kids you taught will remember about you? She replies, "I hope they would remember me as a teacher that made learning exciting and fun." Her foremost goal as a teacher is that her students love school and know that they can be successful learners. "Kindergarten and its curriculum have changed tremendously since I began teaching 33 years ago, but my students still need to have a safe, stimulating and supportive environment in which to learn."

Live Oak is very fortunate to have a teacher like Rachel Kelley who has dedicated her life and love to teaching. A grandfather of one of her students approached her one day and said with a smile and a laugh, "You have taught my child and my grandchild, you can retire now." Teachers will come and go, but it's always nice when they stay as long as Rachel Kelly has, especially here in Live Oak!

OFFICE OF EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

The New Year has arrived and looking back on 2011 it was a prosperous year, at least from our perspective in emergency management. With the exception of a little ice and snow way back in February, it was a very safe year. We experienced very few severe weather events however the drought was persistent throughout the year. The wildfire danger was very high all over the State and wild land fires devastated many areas. Fortunately we only experienced a few small brush fires in the city with only one that actually threatened a structure.

As predicted the 2011 hurricane season was a very active with 19 named storms forming in the Atlantic from June to November. In spite of the active season, it was an extremely quiet year as the majority of the storms never made landfall and none affected the State of Texas.

In our last newsletter it was noted that 2011 was going down in the history books as the year with the most disasters nationwide. Fires, floods, earthquakes, tornadoes, severe thunder storms, and winter storms with snow and ice occurred across the country. Sadly this year may be a repeat of last year. The La Nina condition in the Pacific Ocean continues and weather conditions are expected to be the same this year.

During 2011 proclamations were issued by the Mayor for Severe Weather Awareness Week, Hurricane Preparedness Week, and National Preparedness Month.

In 2011 the Office of Emergency Management reviewed the City's emergency plans and numerous changes were made based on new programs and changing conditions across the nation. A training exercise was held in July involving all departments that dealt with a hazardous materials accident on the highway. Surprisingly one week later an accident occurred less then a quarter of a mile away that also involved a tractor-trailer truck overturning on the highway. Fortunately it only carried gravel! Finally in 2011 the City joined many other jurisdictions in using the on-line Web EOC program to manage any potential disasters or significant events.

In closing, all citizens are reminded that you should have a family disaster plan along with some essential supplies. All residents with a listed telephone numbers should already be included, however if you have an unlisted telephone number you are not included. In addition if you would like to add cellular numbers, text messaging or e-mails, you may do so by simply going to the city web site. Under City Services click on Connect CTY item for a direct portal to the system along with some additional information on it. Just follow the simply instructions. As a reminder there are NO individual costs for this service.





Making Our Neighborhoods a Better Place

Trash, Debris & High Grass

Even during the fall months, our grass still grows in South Texas. We ask that property owners continue to keep their grass below the twelve (12) inches in height that is established by our ordinance. Property owners and tenants are responsible for keeping their lawns mowed to the edge of the roadway. Those in violation who fail to comply with a courtesy notice request to mow are subject to having their property mowed by a City-hired contractor and the cost passed on to the owner.

In addition, please help us keep the trash and debris that is accumulated in public view to a minimum. The fines for these violations are substantial and we ask that you do your part to make Live Oak a more beautiful city. These citations can be issued daily for the violation and the dollar amounts can really stack up. Homeowners can contact the Utility Department at 210-653-9140, extensions 225 or 226 for dates on brush and bulk item pick-up.

Fences

Many times, fencing on a property is the most noticeable thing in terms of appearance. Our City's zoning regulations require property owners maintain their fences in a reasonably plumb and structurally sound condition. Our Code Compliance department requires owners to remove, repair, or replace fences identified in violation. Each structural and decorative member of a fence shall be free of deterioration and be compatible in size, material and appearance with the remainder of the fence. A fence that has deteriorated to a condition that it is likely to fall shall be repaired or replaced. Fences shall not be externally braced in lieu of replacing or repairing posts, columns or other structural members. Residential fences may not exceed 6 feet unless they border a commercially zoned property.

The City's Code of Ordinances and Property Maintenance sections are in effect to raise the standards in Live Oak to help enhance our neighborhoods.



Reporting Complaints

Any complaints regarding code violations (including graffiti) can be reported after normal business hours by calling 210-653-0033 or by contacting Code Compliance at 210-653-9140, extension 245, Monday through Friday, 8am to 5pm. You may also inform us of violations by email at jdalton@liveoaktx.net. Issues are typically inspected the same day.

What You Can Do To Help Prevent Flooding

There are many things that you can do to help prevent flooding. During flooding events, the City has a drainage system that is designed to move water away from private property. Here are some things you can do to help prevent damage due to flooding.

- 1. Do not dump or throw anything into the City's drainage channels. Dumping in our ditches is a violation of Live Oak City Ordinance. Even grass clippings and branches can accumulate and plug channels. A plugged channel cannot carry water and when it rains, the water does not pass and backs up on property behind. Every piece of trash contributes to the flooding problems of the City.
- 2. If your property is next to a ditch or stream, please do your part to keep the banks clear of brush and debris. The City has a stream maintenance program which can help remove major blockages such as downed trees.
- 3. If you see dumping or debris in the ditches or streams, please contact the Public Works Department at 653-9140 ext. 234.
