Dear Citizens of Live Oak,  
The rustling of the fall leaves and the memories of my mom's turkey and dressing fill my thoughts this time of year. Fall is my favorite season because it gives hope of change (ok, cooler weather) and the prospect of new beginnings. In September many of our citizens were affected by power outages caused by Hurricane Hermine. The staff and I met with representatives from CPS Energy to insure that they were doing all that they could to quickly remedy the situation. With the help from the local Red Cross, emergency efforts were ready to be implemented if necessary. It was heartwarming to see how neighbors came together to help each other during this time.

Isn't that what our community is all about?

The Public Works department, along with the Parks and Recreation Commission hosted our first movie in the park. It was a huge success with over 500 residents and neighbors enjoying a beautiful night and the Disney film *Over the Hedge*. The City Wide Garage Sale was a big hit with residents wanting to clean out their garages and making some money doing it. Hopefully this will be an annual event.

The 2010/2011 annual budget was approved by City Council. The bulk of the budget continues to fund the core function of the City and also several items of concern including code enforcement, customer service and internal administrative support. The City Council also adopted a new tax rate to support the approved budget at \$0.476783 per \$100 valuation, after all exemptions are applied. Although it is an increase to the current tax rate, the adopted rate brings in fewer taxes than the City brought in last year on properties taxed in both years. The average taxable homestead of \$88,037 would see a slight increase in taxes by approximately a dollar per month due to commercial properties seeing an even greater decrease in property values than residential.

I am pleased that National night Out was such a success in our community. Many of our neighbors participated with great food and fellowship.

In closing, I would like to say I am humbled by your confidence and look forward to our working together to make Live Oak a great place to work, play and shop.

## City of Live Oak Receives Grants

The Edwards Aquifer Authority recently awarded two matching fund grants to the Live Oak Water System for community water conservation projects. The grants are \$12,500 for a system-wide leak detection testing of water lines and \$20,000 for a water efficient toilet replacement program. The program is limited to 400 water efficient toilets. The program is for single family residential customers on the Live Oak Water System with homes built prior to 1992 (other restrictions apply). ## 3 Types of Stormwater Pollution

All types of pollution end up discharging into waterways as sediment, sludge and solids. These can be caught in expensive stormwater treatment filters but the most effective way to reduce this problem is to prevent pollution from entering the stormwater system in the first place.

- Litter, such as cigarette butts, cans, paper or plastic bags (sometimes called gross pollutants)
- Chemical Pollution, such as detergents, oil or fertilizers
- Natural Pollution, such as leaves, garden clippings, animal droppings, sediment and silt

### Holiday Season greetings from your police department!

As a result of the recent graduation of Class 2010 of the Citizen's Police Academy, a new volunteerism initiative was birthed in the City: Live Oak Citizen Assisting Police (CAP). The initiative was developed by Dan Pue, the Assistant Police Chief, who modeled the Live Oak program after the San Antonio Police Department's Volunteer in Police Program.

Chief Pue's CAP program enlists graduates of the Live Oak Citizen's Police Academy alumni and trains them to support the police department in a variety of operations. To name just a few of the operational areas where our CAP volunteers may be found is in the records management area filing or sorting police documents; in the municipal court providing clerical assistance on trial dates and assisting the court clerk with the court docket; in the patrol area responding to missing children or other major scenes to provide an extra set of eyes and ears; and in special operations to help in the rehabilitation of police personnel during lengthy special operations.

We believe the CAP volunteers are invaluable resources that are adaptable to most any situation that develops. Chief Pue looks to develop the program further and deploy our CAP volunteers into the community to support other areas of police operations.

## Tropical Storm Hermine!!!

Early in the month of September, Hurricane Hermine crossed south Texas providing our region with high wind and rain conditions that we have not seen in several years. A large number of residents suffered damage to trees on their property and there were many drainage channels that were obstructed by falling branches and debris.

This highlights the importance of flood insurance, even if you do not live in or near a special flood hazard area. If flood channels become blocked, they can cause localized flooding even in areas where high water doesn't normally occur. Damage caused from this type of flooding can only be mitigated by Flood Insurance. The purchase of flood insurance is mandatory for federally backed mortgages on buildings located in special flood hazard areas, but could be a valuable option if you live near a flood channel or area where obstructed drainage channels could force water to look for another course.

### Were You Prepared for Hermine?

Over the Labor Day weekend a depression in the Gulf quickly became Tropical Storm Hermine. It made landfall Monday night and on Tuesday it moved over our City. High winds and heavy rainfall fell most of the day and again overnight. Fortunately little structural damage occurred however many trees were lost along with hundreds of branches, a few fences, and a patio cover or two. The biggest problem was the loss of power around the City. In some cases it was restored within an hour or so, however a few areas were without power for over 24 hours and others for 2 whole days. Needless to say there were outages throughout Bexar County and CPS-Energy worked around the clock making repairs.

Those citizens who were without power for more than a few hours experienced several problems such as lost food in refrigerators and freezers; warm temperatures and no air-conditioning; and possibly some medical equipment issues. Needless

to say City Hall received numerous telephone calls relating to the outages however the City can only offer limited assistance in facilitating the restoration of electrical power to your home.

In general, power outages are an important issue that citizens should address in their preparedness plan. First of all if your power goes out call CPS-Energy at 353-4357 and report the outage so your address and number are in their computer system. In addition, you may contact City Hall to inform us of the outage, as the City may be unaware of it. When you call you will be asked your name, address, and home phone so we can identify the area. Secondly, keep refrigerators and freezers closed! Depending on the situation it may be wise to secure your home and go to the home of a friend or relative, may be a shopping mall, or some other location where there is power and air-conditioning or heat! One suggestion at this point might be to go to the store and purchase some bags of ice to put in your freezer or refrigerator. This can help keep your food safe.

If there are family members that have special needs then extra preparedness planning may be needed. First of all we ask that you register with the City's Special Needs Program so we know who you are and where you live. In addition it is extremely important that family members who fall into this category are prepared to deal with an emergency such as a power outage. The City cannot provide you with a portable generator and we have limited resources to establish shelters as this is a Red Cross function. Generally speaking a power outage is not a disaster!

citizens should have a portable radio with extra batteries on hand along with several flashlights or other types of battery powered lights. The use of candles or other devices with an open flame are discouraged. In addition make sure you have a phone that is working. Have a basic phone that plugs into a wall jack or a charged cell phone. Cordless phones usually don't work when there is no power.

## Fire Department

In an effort to better educate communities throughout the U.S. about smoke alarm recommendations, the nonprofit National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) promoted "Smoke Alarms: A Sound You Can Live With!" as the theme for this year's Fire Prevention Week campaign, October 3-9, which the City of

Live Oak supported locally. NFPA has been the official sponsor of Fire Prevention Week for 88 years.

"Many homes in Live Oak may not have any smoke alarms, not enough smoke alarms, alarms that are too old, or alarms that are not working," says Charles Foster, Fire Chief of the Live Oak Fire

Department. "We want residents to understand that working smoke alarms are needed in every home, on every level, outside each sleeping area and inside each bedroom. And, if a smoke alarm is 10 years old or older, it needs to be replaced."

According to Chief Foster, smoke alarms can mean the difference between life and death in a fire. NFPA statistics show that working smoke alarms cut the chance of dying in a fire nearly in half. But they must be working properly to do so. The association's data shows that many homes have smoke alarms that aren't working or maintained properly, usually because of missing, disconnected or dead batteries. Roughly two-thirds of all home fire deaths result from fires in homes with no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms.

The Live Oak Fire Department hosted activities during Fire Prevention Week to promote "Smoke Alarms: A Sound You Can Live With!" locally, and to help Live Oak residents understand NFPA's smoke alarm recommendations. Through these educational, family-oriented activities, residents learned more about the power of smoke alarms, newer options for installing and maintaining them properly, and ultimately, how to better protect their loved ones from fire.

The NFPA and the Live Oak Fire Department agree that interconnected smoke alarms offer the best protection; when one sounds, they all do. This is particularly important in larger or multi-story homes, where the sound from distant smoke alarms may be reduced to the point that it may not be loud enough to provide proper warning, especially for sleeping individuals.

"Most people have a sense of complacency about smoke alarms because they already have one in their homes. Fire Prevention Week provides an excellent opportunity to re-educate people about smoke alarms, new technologies and expanded options for installation and maintenance," says Judy Comoletti, division manager for NFPA public education. "Ultimately, we want this year's campaign to serve as a call to action for households nationwide to inspect their homes to ensure that their families have the full smoke alarm protection that's recommended."

**The Live Oak Fire Department offers the following tips for making sure smoke alarms are maintained and working properly:**

- Test smoke alarms at least once a month using the test button, and make sure everyone in your home knows their sound.
- If an alarm "chirps," warning the battery is low, replace the battery right away.
- Replace all smoke alarms, including alarms that use 10-year batteries and hard-wired alarms, when they're 10 years old (or sooner) if they do not respond properly when tested.
- Never remove or disable a smoke alarm.

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
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# North East ISD



North East ISD has completed the upgrade of the telephone system at the North East Education Center building (also known as the Central Office) and is upgrading the campus phone systems throughout the 2010-2011 and 2011-2012 school years. This upgrade allows the district to improve service, cut expenses and offer more functionality for employees.

With the new phone system, comes new phone numbers. In addition to the improvements in service and reliability, a cost savings of about \$120,000 per year will be realized by the district.

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

Posting on utility poles is prohibited. Illumination is prohibited. Size is limited to four (4) square feet in face area. Signs may be erected no earlier than two (2) days prior to the garage sale and must be removed within two (2) days of the garage sale.

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
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
