Celebrate the Holidays Safely with "TLC"!

According to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), December and January are the peak months for the overall number of home fires, deaths and injuries. Families should be aware that each year an average of 240 home fires start with Christmas trees and an additional 1,300 begin with various other seasonal decorations.

By following the simple guidelines of "TLC" Safety (Tree, Light and Candle), your family's holiday season will remain memorable for the right reasons.

"T" is for Tree

Families must be mindful of unintended dangers when decorating with a Christmas tree. Following a few simple safety guidelines can prevent fires from happening:

- When using a real tree, cut 1-2 inches off the bottom and place the tree in water as soon as possible.
- Remember to keep your tree base filled with water at all times. A tree's needles can dry out and catch fire easily.
- Place your tree a safe distance (at least 3 feet) from fireplaces, radiators, space heaters, heating vents and other heat sources.

"L" is for Lights

Holiday lights, extension cords and other electrical items may pose potential safety hazards. Keep these safety tips in mind when using electrical decorations:

- Carefully inspect electrical decorations. Cracked sockets, and frayed, bare or loose wires, can cause a serious electric shock or start a fire. Replace damaged items with new, UL-LISTED decorations.
- Do not connect more than three light string sets together. Light strings with screw-in bulbs should have a maximum of 50 bulbs connected together.
- Turn off all electrical light strings and decorations before leaving your home or going to bed.

"C" is for Candle

Candles are responsible for 71% of December home fires that begin as a result of improper decorating practices. Follow these safety tips when using candles:

- Never leave a room where candles are lit. Always blow them out!
- Keep candles away from decorations, curtains, bedding, paper, furniture and other combustible materials.
- Keep candles out of the reach and path of children and pets.

Holiday Recipes

BIG FAT CHEWY CHOLOCATE CHIP COOKIES

Ingredients

- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 3/4 cup unsalted butter, melted
- 1 cup packed brown sugar
- 1/2 cup white sugar
- 1 tablespoon vanilla extract
- 1 egg
- 1 egg yolk
- 2 cups semisweet chocolate chips

Directions

1. Preheat the oven to 325 degrees. Lightly grease cookie sheets. 2. Sift together the flour, baking soda and salt; set aside.

3. In a medium bowl, cream together the melted butter, brown sugar and white sugar until well blended. Beat in the vanilla, egg, and egg yolk until light and creamy. Mix in the sifted ingredients until just blended. Stir in the chocolate chips by hand using a wooden spoon. Drop cookie dough 1/4 cup at a time onto the prepared cookie sheets. Cookies should be about 3 inches apart. 4. Bake for 15 to 17 minutes in the preheated oven, or until the edges are lightly toasted. Cool on baking sheets for a few minutes before transferring to wire racks to cool completely.

CAKE MIX COOKIES (Great Recipe for the Kiddos)

Ingredients

- 1 18.25 ounce box cake mix (any flavor)
- 1/2 cup margarine or butter
- 2 eggs
- 1-2 cups of ** (chocolate or any flavored chips, nuts, coconut, raisins, or candy)

Directions

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Lightly grease cookie sheet(s). Mix together cake mix, margarine or butter, and eggs in a large bowl. Stir in 1-2 cups of ** Drop by rounded tablespoons on cookie sheets. Bake for 8 to 10 minutes. Remove from pan and cool on wire cooling racks. (Optional: Top with M&M's before baking or ice when cooled).

PROTECT OUR WATER SOURCE

Did you know the storm drains in our City flow to our City Lake and wetland areas, and not a waste facility? Many people are unaware that grass clippings, used motor oil, and other waste products dumped into storm drains or streets pollute lakes and water sources.

Our storm drainage system is designed to direct the flow of excess water from our streets and properties during rainy weather. This water is not filtered, and, although our drains do have grates that keep out some of the larger debris, small debris is allowed to go through and flows into the system.

Some towns have special reminders like "If You Dump It, You Drink It", "The Drain is Just For Rain", and "Don't Feed the Storm Drain" to help their citizens to remember not to wash pesticides, soapy water, motor oil and other household chemicals near or into the storm drains.

What can you do help the situation and be part of the solution?

- Never dump anything near or into a storm drain or drainage channel, including grass clippings.
- Use fertilizers and pesticides only when less toxic methods have failed. Read and follow the directions on the label for use, clean-up, and disposal.
- Clean up after your pets, disposing of pet feces in a plastic bag in your trash can and not leaving it on the lawn.
- Recycle your motor oil and other disposal products. Many automotive supply stores and oil changing companies offer this service.

With your help, we can keep pollutants out of our lake and downstream creeks and rivers.

WATER SAVING TIPS FOR YOUR HOME

Repair leaking faucets, nozzles, pipes, and toilets. When you do have to water your lawn and garden, do so in the evening or early morning. Use mulch around plants and shrubs to help retain moisture. Sweep clippings and leaves instead of using the hose. Obey all water bans and regulations.

PET OWNERS

Two of the major challenges presented to today's Animal Control Officers are pet overpopulation and increased integration of wild animals into suburban communities. Both issues are becoming more difficult to manage as the numbers in both areas continue to rise. Many animal shelters run at capacity trying to keep up with the influx of stray dogs and cats. Wild animals are losing their habitats to new residential, business, and educational development projects. Live Oak is no exception to these unfortunate trends, and the real solution rests with the pet owners within the community.

Every pet owner can help with the overpopulation issue by having their pet spayed or neutered. This will reduce unwanted litters, strays, and prevent possible future health issues. You can also help with the wildlife problem by not leaving dog or cat food outside.

The threat of rabies increases with the rise in the suburban wildlife population. All pet owners must insure their pets are properly vaccinated against rabies. All pet owners are also required to obtain a city pet license. Live Oak recognizes both 1-year and 3-year rabies vaccinations. Just bring in the certificate of rabies vaccination to City Hall or the Animal Control Facility. Thank you for being a responsible pet owner.

Illegal Dumping Onto Land or Into Water

Illegal dumping is a growing problem across the state and throughout the City of Live Oak. In the most common form of illegal dumping, people dump waste at remote locations or on an undeveloped property instead of in a landfill. There is no typical "illegal dumper", it can be anyone.

Illegal dumping is not only aesthetically unappealing, it can pose a threat to human health. Rats, mice, mosquitoes, and flies can all carry disease and are attracted to unkempt areas that contain food scraps. Water resources such as ponds, lakes, and our aquifer, can also become polluted.

Regulations regarding illegal dumping can be found in the Texas Health and Safety Code (THSC) Chapter 365, Section 012, Litter Abatement Act. The following penalties apply:

Class C Misdemeanor - Litter of 15 pounds or less, or a volume of 5 gallons or less.

Class B Misdemeanor - More than 5 pounds, but less than 500, or a volume of more than 5 gallons but less than 100 cubic feet.

Class A Misdemeanor - Over 500 pounds but under 1,000 pounds, or litter from a commercial entity weighing more than 5 pounds or having a volume greater than 13 gallons.

State Jail Felony - Over 1000 Pounds.

How You Can Help:

- Always dispose of your own litter properly and encourage others to do the same.
- Do not transport unsecured debris in the back of a vehicle.
 Debris flying out of trucks is subject to the same penalties.
- Spread the word to friends and neighbors that illegal dumping is a crime.
- Do not drain your pools into the city streets or on private property. It must be drained into your sewer flush out pipe.
- Any home improvement project debris should be properly disposed in a landfill.
- Do not dispose of grass cuttings or tree branches over your fences into utility easements or the city streets.
- You can report illegal dumping within the city limits by calling the communications center at 210-653-0033, twenty-four hours daily.

This year may very well go down in the history books as the year with the most disasters nationwide.

We have seen it all! Fires, floods, earthquakes, tornadoes, severe thunderstorms, and winter storms with snow and ice have occurred across the country, not to mention the persistent drought across Texas. In fact Texas has seen all of the other ones too! Fortunately we haven't seen them all in Live Oak! In fact we have been pretty lucky here in the City except for the drought. We had a little ice and snow back in February however we haven't had any severe thunderstorms, earthquakes, floods, or serious wildfires in the City so far this year. Hopefully we can make it through the next couple of months without any major incidents.

If you recall September was National Preparedness Month and hopefully everyone not only took some time to remember the events of September 11th, 2001, but also took some time to get better prepared. All citizens should have a family disaster plan along with some essential supplies on hand. If a family member is disabled or may require assistance, make sure you include that in your plan and don't forget about your pets! Include them in the plan. New Emergency Alert System

The current Emergency Alert System (EAS) has been around for many years however it will soon be replaced by the Intergrated Public Alert and Warning System or IPAWS. This new system will include the latest technology including the capability to send messages to cellular phones and e-mail in addition to notifying all radio and TV stations. According to federal officials the system will not be fully operational until sometime next year; however a test has been scheduled for Wednesday, November 9th, 2011, tentatively at 2:00 PM.

Connect CTY Telephone Alert System

Just a reminder! Citizens – Have you signed up for the Connect CTY telephone alert system? All residents with a listed telephone number should already be included, however if you have an unlisted telephone number you are not included. In addition if you would like to add cellular numbers, text messaging or e-mails, you may do so by simply going to the city web site. Under City Services click on Connect CTY item for a direct portal to the system along with some additional information on it. Just follow the simply instructions. As a reminder there are NO individual costs for this service.

Residential and Business Alarm Ordinance Amended

Ordinance Number 1451 amending Chapter 19, Article IV of the Code of Ordinances for the City of Live Oak was passed, approved and adopted on May 31, 2011 (www.liveoaktx.net, Code of Ordinances, Part II, Chapter 19, Article IV).

Amendments include:

- The non-refundable fee of \$50 per year is required for each permit or renewal of permit for private residence, commercial establishments, and financial institution.
- An alarm user shall be subject to fines for signaling of a false alarm by a burglar alarm system if at least three other false alarms have occurred during the preceding 12-month period. The amount of the penalty for the signaling of a false alarm may not exceed:
- 1. \$50, if the location has had more than three but fewer than six other false alarms in the preceding 12-month period;
- 2. \$75, if the location has had more than five but fewer than eight other false alarms in the preceding 12 month period;
- 3. \$100, if the location has had eight or more other false alarms in the preceding 12-month period.

The City may suspend or refuse to renew an alarm system permit for any violation of this article. The City may revoke or refuse to renew the permit of an alarm system that has had eight or more false alarms during the preceding 12-month period.

Duties of Alarm System Company include:

- 1. Notification to occupant of the applicable law relating to false alarms;
- 2. How to prevent false alarms;
- 3. How to operate the alarm system.

Do you have a Lawn Irrigation system?



If your answer is yes, you should have a device located somewhere on your property which may look similar to one of these images.

Their primary function is to prevent cross contamination of the city's potable water system. National water codes and guidelines call for approved backflow protection on all lawn sprinkler systems and the backflow protection be tested yearly and maintained in working condition. At installation, it is the property owner's responsibility to provide the proper Live Oak Backflow Test & Maintenance (T&M) form with the test results for recording purposes. Each year a letter and Backflow T&M report form will be mailed to the property owner as a reminder to provide the City with the annual test results.

This is required by Texas Commission of Environmental Quality (TCEQ) and the following adopted Plumbing Code:

International Plumbing Code

608.16.5 Connections to lawn irrigation systems. The potable water supply to lawn irrigation systems shall be protected against backflow by an atmospheric-type vacuum breaker, a pressure-type vacuum breaker or a reduced pressure principle backflow preventer.

30 TAC 290 Subchapter D: Rules and Regulations for public water systems 290.44(h) (1) No water connection from any public drinking water system shall be allowed to any residence or establishment where an actual or potential contamination hazard exists unless the public water facilities are protected from contamination.

NORTHEAST METHODIST HOSPITAL "Just What the Doctor Ordered"

Walking into the Northeast Methodist Hospital after its renovation, I was amazed at the friendly improvements to the lobby. I was visiting a sick friend and nothing surprised me more than when the friendly attendant directed me to the second hallway of the Emergency Department. "Second hallway?" I asked, "When did you all get two hallways?"

Having grown up with Live Oak, I can remember a time when the Emergency Room section of the hospital was two rooms, one with patients and one with worried family members. I had a hard time believing that there could have been such a tremendous growth for this beautiful facility that caters to the residents of our entire region.

The hospital was built on the hallowed grounds of the once famous Judson Four Drive-in Theater. It opened its doors in 1985 as Village Oaks Hospital by its owner, the Hospital Corporation of America. In 1995 it became part of the Methodist Healthcare System and the name was changed to Northeast Methodist Hospital. In 2004, they conducted a "skybreaking" ceremony to kick off their significant expansion project. Under the watchful eye of the hospital's Chief Executive Officer Mark Bernard, its capacity increased to 174 hospital beds and significantly upgraded its services for intensive and emergency care.

Playing a significant role in the economic growth that has been experienced by northeast Bexar County, the hospital has had to keep pace with the increasing demands of a growing region. Many of these increasing demands influence the residents of the region directly. Methodist Healthcare offers free HealthBus transportation that is available for residents who live within the zip code areas near the hospital, and Hospital employees give back to the local communities by donating their services in civic events that take place throughout the region. Last May, several of the nursing staff contributed their time helping with the children's games for Live Oak's Park Day, sponsored by our Parks and Recreation.

And the recognition received by the hospital continues to grow. Recently, the Texas Department of State Health Services designated Northeast Methodist Hospital as a Primary Level II stroke facility, demonstrating their commitment to providing superior care to stroke patients. Northeast Methodist Hospital Fast Facts

Northeast Methodist Hospital has played a major role in the phenomenal economic growth experienced in northeast Bexar County. Located in the city of Live Oak at Interstate 35 and Judson Road, Northeast Methodist Hospital has undergone a significant series of renovations inside and out. As a result, the hospital has been able to keep pace with the increasing demands of this growing community. Northeast Methodist Hospital has built upon its already welldeserved reputation by offering outstanding emergency care for adults and children, open heart surgery, cardiac catheterization, general surgery, orthopedics, in-patient rehabilitation, gastroenterology and cancer care.



Hospital Highlights

- Northeast Methodist Hospital opened in 1985 as Village Oaks Hospital and became part of the Methodist Healthcare System in 1995. The hospital's name was changed to Northeast Methodist Hospital.
- The emergency department features 26 individual treatment rooms with cable television and 10 Fast Track rooms to help the staff care for patients with less urgent needs, but in a more timely fashion.
- The hospital offers free valet parking for guests but recently built a parking garage for employees and physicians to make more spaces in the surface parking lot available for patients and their families.
- Northeast Methodist Hospital features a comprehensive, coordinated, medically-based program in a hospital setting for those who require inpatient rehabilitation and 24hour medical and nursing care. All therapy is provided by licensed physical therapists, occupational therapists, and speech/language therapists in one-on-one sessions. The unit features 13 private rooms with home-like touches to help patients transition between being in the hospital and returning home.

- The staff at Northeast Methodist Hospital performs 500 cardiac catheterizations a month, putting it among the fastest growing heart services program in South Texas. Northeast Methodist Hospital is also unique in providing individualized education and guidance by a dedicated cardiac liaison nurse.
- Northeast Methodist Hospital provides compassionate care to cancer patients with physicians working alongside specially trained and certified oncology nurses, dietitians, caseworkers and chaplains. Team members work with individual patients and their families to help them cope during the process of diagnosis, surgery, chemotherapy and/or radiation treatment.
- The Northeast Methodist Hospital Volunteer Auxiliary, Heartbeat of the Hospital, contributes many hours taking care of the hospital's information desk, providing refreshments to family members whose loved ones are undergoing surgery and running the hospital's gift shop. Profits from the shop along with other sales helped to contribute \$20,000 of scholarship funds in May for students pursuing health care related careers.


