

The great thing about buying local is that the proceeds stay in Live Oak. The more business local establishments get, the more they have to further invest in the business, and therefore better serve the customers.


#### Think Local - Buy Local - Be Local!

If you happen to see Loren in the community, make sure you say "Hi" and thank him for a iob well done.


#### Shari Conley, Owner of Elegant Looks Salon




## In the Spotlight

Live Oak has had its share of famous visitors. Recently, we posted an autographed picture of the late Sherman Hemsley who visited the grand opening of a cleaners in town, NFL Hall of Famer Sonny Jorgenson visited the Halftime Lounge for their grand opening and some of the really old timers can tell you that both Jimmy Dean and William Boyd of TV's Hopalong Cassidy fame spent time at Boysville entertaining the children when it was located in Live Oak. However, we never seem to hear about local folks who grew up in Live Oak and have gone on to become celebrities in their own chosen career fields. This article is dedicated to three former Live Oak residents who have left their roots firmly in the ground here but moved on to achieve celebrity status.

Kelly Morton spent his entire childhood in Live Oak. Anyone who has historically visited the Dairy Queen on Village Oak knows Kelly's mother Jackie, who worked there for many, many years. Kelly's non-assuming personality would leave an acquaintance with no idea of his employment. What you wouldn't guess, is that Kelly is a professional comedian, performing in places all over the United States, alongside of such comedy greats as Bill Maher and Dane Cook. Currently living in California, but still proud to call Live Oak home, Kelly is a well-seasoned comedy writer who uses high energy and quick wit to entertain crowds with his "say anything" humor.

In addition to his comedy performances, Kelly owns a businesses called "That's the Spirit" that provides TABC training to bar and wait staff throughout the San Antonio region. He is also on the cusp of an off-shoot company called "Breathe Dummy" that will provide lifesaving CPR training, without the typical boredom of most Red Cross classes. Much to our surprise, Kelly recently attended a City Council meeting where he, among other things, confessed to childhood transgressions, praised the City for its progress and offered his own ideas on suggested city slogans, not one of which I feel comfortable printing in this article, but all funny in their own way.

Look for Kelly at either the Laugh Out Loud or the Rivercenter Comedy Clubs, right here in San Antonio. Interestingly, both of those venues are currently owned by the Barshop family. For many years, Sam Barshop owned significant



portions of property in what is now the City of Live Oak. Mr. Barshop is somewhat of a historical celebrity for the San Antonio region and has contributed significantly to the University of the Incarnate Word and other institutions in San Antonio.

Kelly Morton will be performing here in San Antonio at the River Center Comedy Club November 14-18th.



Painting is something that **Erik Parker** always knew he had a talent for. Born in Germany, his family moved to Live Oak when he was young. Growing up on Leading Oaks, he attended Judson High School and later San Antonio College that had a significant influence on him. Later he attended the University of Texas with a degree in fine arts. He also received a graduate degree from Purchase College in New York with a Master's Degree in fine arts. He currently lives in New York City where he continues painting and contributing to the arts. Parker's paintings have been described as "sly humor of satirical cartoons." They provide brightly colored vistas of worlds with flowers, non-geometric shapes and aloof appearing characters in their own artistry. He has had two gallery showings

at Paul Kasmin's Gallery on 10th Avenue in New York City. The first entitled a "Colorful Resistance" is a compilation of Erik's lifelong works. The most recent however is entitled "Bye Bye Babylon" and recently opened on September 6th, 2012, running through October 13th, 2012. The "Bye Bye Babylon" show includes paintings with the artists own interpretation on beaches and their accoutrements of surreal visualizations. Erik draws his inspiration from the landscape drawings of French painter Henri Rousseau, and Joseph Yoakum, an African American artist of Native American descent who drew unique landscapes with an individual style. You should not be surprised in Parker's works to see snaking vines, colorful, claw-like leaves and images that that reveal vivid beaches with sprawling mountains in the foreground. The best description of Parker's work opines that it is "seductive and eerie; visually sensible but also askew." His work has also been displayed at Fort Worth Modern Museum in Texas; Colette in Paris, France; Honor Fraser in Los Angeles, California; and also participated in shows around the world.

**Belle Foster** was born in Elsa, Texas, and became an Air Force wife when she married Kenneth Foster in 1958. She followed him to Europe and started formally studying art in Verona, Italy in 1961. She received an art degree from the University of Munich in 1971. She painted for many years in Europe and in 1975 she and her husband bought a house on Northledge Drive where she lived for 30 years. She has paintings that are currently owned by the late Presidents Lyndon Johnson and displayed in the LBJ Presidential Museum, former Presidents Richard Nixon and later, both George H. and George W. Bush. She painted under the name of "His Kingdom Art" and most of her artistry are prophetic reflections that she feels inspires her works. Her paintings range from an artistic view of the cross, depicted with

flowers, to grandiose portraits of Christ engaging in biblically significant events. One of her most famous pieces, "His Kingdom at Hand" was unveiled at the Pentagon in 1974 and was on display at the Staten Island Military Museum in New York City for 21 years. This piece now is displayed at the World of Pentecost Church in San Antonio. Closer to home, Belle has a mural entitled "Christ Calming Storm" that for years has been in the possession of the Living Way Church, right here in the City of Live Oak. Belle moved to Bulverde to live with her daughter several years ago, but has maintained a homestead in Live Oak for members of her family.

This is just a thin slice of residents from Live Oak who have gone on to achieve great things in their chosen profession. For additional information on any of these individuals, please don't hesitate to surf the web or ask around to some of your neighbors. Future celebrities could be living right next door.

Winter holidays are a time for families and friends to get together. But that also means a greater risk for fire. Following a few simple tips will ensure a happy and fire-safe holiday season.



- Be careful with holiday decorations. Choose decorations that are flame resistant or flame retardant.
- Keep lit candles away from decorations and other things that can burn.
- Some lights are only for indoor or outdoor use, but not both.
- Replace any string of lights with worn or broken cords or loose bulb connections. Connect no more than three strands of mini light sets and a maximum of 50 bulbs for screw-in bulbs. Read manufacturer's instructions for number of LED strands to connect.
- Use clips, not nails, to hang lights so the cords do not get damaged.
- Keep decorations away from windows and doors.

#### **HOLIDAY ENTERTAINING**

- Test your smoke alarms and tell guests about your home fire escape plan.
  - Keep children and pets away from lit candles.
- Keep matches and lighters up high in a locked cabinet.
- Stay in the kitchen when cooking on the stovetop.
- Ask smokers to smoke outside. Remind smokers to keep their smoking materials with them so young children do not touch them.
- Provide large, deep ashtrays for smokers. Wet cigarette butts with water before discarding.

#### Must Do

**Blow out** lit candles when you leave the room or go to bed. Turn off all light strings and decorations before leaving home or going to bed.

#### **FACTS**

- (1) Holiday decoration fires are most likely to happen in the living room, family room or den.
- (1) Almost half of all home decoration fires are started by candles.
- Half of holiday decoration fires happen because decorations are placed too close to a heat source.

#### **Cellular Telephone Alerts**


The federal government is in the process of updating the nations' emergency warning system replacing the current Emergency Alert System with the Integrated Public Alert and Warning System (IPAWS). In April of 2012 the latest technology was rolled out by FEMA with the Commercial Mobile Alerting System (CMAS). Text messages known as Wireless

can now be sent to cellular phones across the nation. These messages are broadcast by the cellular towers to all phones within the area of an emergency. Messages will include presidential alerts. Amber Alerts, and imminent life-threatening situations. The alerts will come with a distinctive tone and a short text message. There is no cost involved and do not

These messages can be issued by all levels of government following strict standards set by FEMA. That's the good news, however! Read on

At the present time some citizens probably have relular phones in use to have the technology to receive these messages.

#### **September Town Hall Meetings** on Preparedness

The "Town Hall" meetings on Family Preparedness held on September 12th and 13th, 2012, were somewhat successful. A total of 15 people attended the two sessions and learned about the potential hazards along with the basics of developing a "Family Disaster Plan" and the supplies everyone should have on hand.

#### **Connect CTY Telephone Alert System**

All citizens - Have you signed up for the Connect CTY telephone alert system? All residents with a listed telephone numbers should already be included, however if you have an unlisted telephone number you are not included. In addition we highly encourage you to add cellular numbers and text messaging to the system. In the event of a serious emergency this may be the only way the City can provide lifesaving information to you. If the power is out and if telephone lines are down, many citizens will not

be able to receive any messages regarding the emergency unless your cellular numbers are listed in our system. To add numbers simply go to the city web site. Under City Services click on Connect CTY for a direct portal to the system along with some additional information on it. Just follow the simple instructions. lection of the events that led to her incarceration at this facility." We decided to take action and allow this pup to live the life she was meant to have, to return her to the lifestyle she deserved.



- 4- Green or Macintosh Apples
- ¼ Cup Orange Juice
- 3- Cups Sifted Flour
- 3 tsp. Baking Powder
- 2- Cups Sugar
- 3 ½ tsp. Vanilla
- 1- Cup Vegetable Oil
- 1 tsp. salt
- 4- Eggs
- 2 tsp. cinnamon + 5 Tbs. sugar

Peel and cut apples into cubes. Blend cinnamon and sugar. Sprinkle over apples and set aside. Measure rest of ingredients into a large mixing bowl & beat until smooth. Stir in one cup broken walnuts. Pour half of mixture into a well-greased 10 inch tube pan. Arrange one half of the apples over mixture. Pour rest of batter over apples.

Next arrange the remaining apples on top of the batter. Bake at 350 degrees for  $1\frac{1}{2}$  hours. Allow the cake to cool in an upright position. This cake may be frozen for future use. Garnish with whipped crème or any other topping of your choice.

#### **CORN SALAD**

- 2 tsp. olive oil
- 3 cups thawed or fresh corn kernels
- 3 slices bacon, cut crosswise into 1-in. pieces
- ½ lb. Yukon gold or red potatoes (peeled and diced)
- 1 small red onion thinly sliced
- 1 red bell pepper, cut into ½ in. squares
- 2 Tbsp. cider or rice vinegar
- Salt
- Crushed red pepper flakes

Cook bacon in hot oil in large skillet over medium heat for 5 min. until crisp.

#### Drain

Cook potatoes in 2 Tbsp. bacon drippings for 5 minutes or until golden brown, tossing occasionally. Add red bell pepper and salt to taste; cook 5 minutes or until vegetables are tender, tossing occasionally. Add corn; cook 3 to 5 minutes or until hot. Toss corn mixture in a bowl with onion, vinegar, bacon, salt and crushed red pepper to taste. Serve warm or chilled.

## Common Holiday Dangers for Your Pets

**Bones:** Ingestion of turkey, chicken and ham bones can cause significant damage to the gastrointestinal tract by causing obstructions, tears, punctures, gastric inflammation, vomiting, diarrhea and death.

**Chocolate:** Chocolate (especially dark) contains a substance called theobromine that is toxic and possibly fatal to animals.

**Vegetables**: Onions and garlic contain sulfides that cause the destruction of red blood cells. Avocado leaves, fruit, seeds and bark contain a substance called Persin that can cause a multitude of problems and be dangerous to your pet. Mushrooms contain a variety of toxins depending on the species and can cause kidney and liver failure, central nervous system, seizures, coma, vomiting, diarrhea, cardiac arrhythmias and death.

**Fruits and nuts:** Grapes and raisins, both seeded and seedless, can cause kidney failure in pets. Walnuts and macadamia nuts can cause pancreatitis in pets that result in prolific vomiting, diarrhea, gas and abdominal pain.

#### Meats, gravy and sauces:

These are often too rich for their digestive system and can lead to vomiting, diarrhea, gas, pancreatitis, abdominal pain, lethargy and dehydration.

#### **Holiday Tips to Keep Pets Safe**

**Confine your pet/Kitchen off limits:** When guests come over confine your pet so there's no temptation to sneak them a little treat. Pets will consume anything you drop in the kitchen faster than you think and may easily be left unnoticed by you, but not by your pet.

#### **Monitor your pet's behavior:**

Keep a close eye on your pet. Successful treatment of poisons and toxins often depends upon quick action. In an emergency, seek veterinary help immediately or contact (ASPCA) Animal Poison Control Center at 1-888-426-4435. They are open 24 hours a day, 365 days a year and are staffed by veterinary toxicologists that can provide rapid information about toxins and poisons.


