Overall the budget will allow for all basic city services to remain in place along with planned growth for future capacity. Although there will be a slight increase in the sewer rate, this rate has not been adjusted in 5 years. It also gives me pleasure to inform you that there will be a decrease in your storm water fee.

## **Its History and Future**

For those of you who have been to Live Oak Park and have wondered what those strange looking metal baskets were all about, well here's your answer. They are disc golf baskets. Disc golf is a disc game in which individual players throw a flying disc into a basket or at a target. According to the Professional Disc Golf Association, "The object of the game is to traverse a course from beginning to end in the fewest number of throws of the disc." The first disc was thrown from Tee #1 at the Live Oak Park's Main Pavilion June 1999. The City purchased 13 used baskets and had Mr. John Houck design our experimental course. John has designed more disc golf courses than anyone working today. From neighborhood parks to major multi-course facilities, John has been a leader in disc golf course design. What sets him apart is not the quantity of his work, but the quality. Players recognize his name and make an extra effort to visit his courses.

This was a cost effective way for the City to gauge the interest in this "new" sport for Live Oak citizens. There are currently 39 baskets in the ground and 10 being stored for future use or replacements. The last 38 baskets have been provided by disc golfers with the city providing manpower and material for the concrete tees, a very good partnership!

John's signature in the disc golf industry is the innovation

and creativity he brings to each course that he designs.

Since 1999, with the addition of disc golf, the park has attracted more sports, including baseball, football and soccer. In 12 years our disc course has been used by hundreds of Air Force and Army personnel in our annual Civilian/Military free tournament sponsored by local businesses and disc golfers. Crestview Elementary uses some of the disc golf baskets in their annual science trip to the park. Hundreds of discs with "Get hooked on disc golf not drugs" have been given to elementary students by the Live Oak Police Department. Last year Northeast Lakeview listed a course on disc golf in its class offerings.

There are many different tournaments held weekly and throughout the year with proceeds going to improve the parks and/or local charities. There have been disc golfers in tournaments from all over the United States as well as other countries. Live Oak has even had a few of the top national professionals from other states visit our course!



The disc golf course currently has 7 holes on the college land on the edge of our park on an experimental basis. The plan is to have (2) 18 holes courses primarily on city land and (1) 18 hole course primarily on Lakeview College property. The 5 holes on JISD land will most likely be relocated.

Once the John Houck courses are in, we will be able to expand the levels of tournaments we can host, including national pro and amateur, which means even a greater economic impact on our restaurants, motels, and shopping centers. It has been good to see the positive impact on our city businesses.

In today's world, fewer people are enjoying the great outdoors and have resorted to their televisions, computers, and cell phones. Disc Golf is a great way to get outside, exercise a little and have fun too! The Live Oak area has over 200 very active disc golfers from ages 14 to 70. Go down to the park on the weekends and watch the casual play of groups of teenagers as well as families and children.

## WORKING WITH OUR HOMEOWNER'S ASSOCIATIONS



Development Services works closely with the Homeowner's Associations in our residential areas during small or large build projects. Before issuing any permits for the project, the City requires a Homeowner's Associations (HOA) approval letter from the Board of Directors or an Architectural Control Committee. Most Association's review process takes approximately one to two weeks for review once the plans and request forms are submitted. There are improvement requirement forms available with your particular HOA on their websites along with review process time expectancies.

We encourage you to contact your Homeowner's Association and the city before beginning any type of project. Most associations have developed Rules and Regulations as provided for in your Deed Restrictions or Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions (CC&Rs) and adopted by a Board of Directors or Architectural Control Committee. Rules are established to provide direction to the homeowners for common courtesies with regards to parking, vehicles and pets. In addition to the city's subdivision ordinance and the International Building Code, your Association will adopt Architectural guidelines with procedures for submitting requests to make exterior changes to your home. These rules and guidelines are set up to maintain the aesthetic value and integrity of our subdivisions, community and your investment as well. Such changes may include concrete work, patio covers, decks, sheds, play structures, exterior color changes or extensive interior changes and additions.

Violations of these rules may result in action by the Association or the City with penalty. If you proceed with an exterior improvement without written approval of the Board or a permit from the City, you will be required to remove the alteration. ## National Preparedness Month

This September is the eighth annual National Preparedness Month and this year's slogan is rather special. In remembrance of the 10th anniversary of September 11th, 2001, the slogan is "This September: A Time to Remember, A Time to Prepare!" All citizens should have a family disaster plan and in addition everyone should have some essential supplies on hand. Once you have created your plan it must be kept up-to-date. Hold a family meeting to review your plan, and then conduct a practice session to make sure everyone knows what to do. If a family member is disabled or may require assistance, make sure you include that in your plan. Also don't forget about your pets! Include them in the plan as well. ## New Emergency Alert System

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) will roll out a brand new emergency notification system before the end of the year. This new system will be known as the Integrated Public Alert and Warning System or IPAWS and it will replace the current Emergency Alert System (EAS). This new system will include the latest technology and while it will not be fully operational until sometime next year, a test has tentatively been set for November 9th, 2011. ## CPS-Energy Telephone Alert System

In the aftermath of the February 2011 rolling blackouts, City Public Service (CPS-Energy) has established a new telephone alerting system for all of their customers. The system was designed to send out telephone calls whenever there is the potential for a major power outage, the possibility of rolling blackouts, or possibly when energy conservation is needed. ## **Fire Prevention Week** October 9-15, 2011

When it comes to fire, your best defense is a good offense. Live Oak's Fire Department is teaming up with the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) during Fire Prevention week, October 9-15, 2011. As always, the focus is to prevent home fires.

In 2009, U.S. fire departments responded to more than 360,000 home fires which caused 12,650 injuries and 2,565 deaths. Seconds and minutes can mean the difference between life and death. Preparation is an important part of being able to deal with an emergency and it is crucial you take steps to prepare your family for the potential of a home fire.

#### **Create an Emergency Escape Plan**

- Create an Escape Plan. Visit LOFD newsletter webpage to download a helpful PDF.
- Assign one person to assist infants, older adults, or family members with mobility limitations.
- Ensure your smoke alarms function properly with monthly testing. Visit LOFD newsletter webpage to download a helpful PDF.
- Be prepared for a real fire: when a smoke alarm sounds, get outside immediately.
- Choose an outside meeting place, located a safe distance from your home, where everyone can meet after they've escaped. The meeting place could be a neighbor's house, a light post, mailbox, or any other place that everyone can easily find.
- Once you're outside, stay outside! Do NOT go back into a burning building.
- If someone does not arrive at the meeting place, inform the fire department dispatcher when you call. Firefighters have the skills and equipment to perform rescues.
- Memorize 911 and call AFTER you exit the burning building.
- Practice your home fire escape drill twice a year, making the drill as realistic as possible.

You have probably noticed some unique features on the roofs of several houses and businesses in town. During these tough economic times, many homeowners and businesses in Live Oak have chosen to have solar panels installed to help alleviate some of their electric costs.

A quick drive through Live Oak will find that at least seven homes and one large business has installed these panels and the occupants are currently reaping the financial rewards of tapping into this alternative form of energy. Although the financial savings are significant, many save up to \$100 a month during the summer, financial reasons are not the only deciding factor for a couple of residents.

Live Oak resident Margaret Strauch stated that her family has accused her of being addicted to "do it yourself" type shows on various cable networks. The choice to go solar to supplement her electric usage was an easy decision to make. Stating she wants to do what she can to help the environment, not only has she chosen the solar system to help with her electric bills, but she has also utilized a tankless water heater for efficiency and a dehumidifier to recover moisture from the air and utilizes it to irrigate plants in her garden.

Johnny Rayburg, the office manager for the Alamo City Eye Physicians at 11601 Toepperwein Road states that the idea to install nearly 100 panels on their new office building was initially financial. Since that time, however, they have been pleased with the patient response to their use of alternative energy sources. When Dr. Jon Berry and Dr. William Walton were first approached about the possibility of utilizing solar energy, they were amazed at the rebates through City Public Service and some of the depreciation and tax incentives that they could also take advantage of. These incentives allowed for the recovery of almost 40% of the total cost of the system, and they have noticed a 30% decrease in their monthly energy bills, even during the hottest months of the summer. With additional patient interaction in mind, they have chosen to have an interactive kiosk placed in the lobby of their practice that will allow for patients to monitor the energy produced by their solar panels, and visually see how it augments their total electric usage.

(August 1, 2011) Northeast Lakeview College held its second annual Robotics Camp July 25-29 and this year many more students were able to attend the camp because of donated scholarship funds from The Northeast Partnership for Economic Development and Time Warner Cable. The Northeast Partnership for Economic Development donated \$2250, funding nine students this year. In 2010, the Northeast Partnership donated \$500 which funded scholarships for two students. Time Warner Cable provided \$2,000 in scholarships to fund 10 NLC participants through a grant-funded program. The money from this grant was split between three Alamo Colleges (Northeast Lakeview College, Northwest Vista College, and St. Philip's College). Additionally, Pat O'Brien, a private citizen in the Northeast Lakeview community and a member of the Northeast Partnership also

contributed \$250 to fund one additional student (Zoe Johnson), Johnson, who is six years old, participated in the elementary camp geared for children in grades third through fifth. She is the first 6 year old accepted to one of the elementary camps and according to the instructor, Gloria Schuetze, "she outperformed some students who were at least two grades above her."

Altogether, 34 students participated in the camp and through the generosity of our donors, 24 children were able to participate in the program who otherwise could not afford it. In fact, the elementary camp would not have been possible without the support of scholarship funds.

The camp is a fun-filled, interactive hands-on experience giving children an opportunity to design and build robots. The camp allows students to work in small teams of four, guided by teachers and teacher assistants. The program is intended to generate interest in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) education.



A final showcase event was held on July 29 that was open to the parents and college community where robots from each group competed in mini-challenges and included a final exhibition.
