


National Law Enforcement Appreciation Day

May 2nd - 4th



SINGLE USE DISPOSAL SYSTEM

Thank you for using the Single Use Disposal System!

The Single Use Disposal Systems (SUDS) are a convenient and environmentally friendly way to dispose of your unused or expired prescription medications. The pre-paid TakeAway Envelope allows you to mail your unused and expired prescriptions from the privacy of your own home. They are incinerated unopened keeping themout of our drinking water.

WHAT HAPPENS TO THE ENVELOPE AFTER IT IS MAILED?

The envelopes containing the medications are sent directly to a treatment facility to be incinerated.

ARE TAKEAWAY ENVELOPES SAFE?

Yes, the TakeAway Envelopes are safe. Using the TAE is safer then flushing or throwing the medications in the trash. Incinerating the medications limit the environmental damage that medications can have by preventing them from polluting our drinking water.

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) recommends incineration as the method of drug destruction, which meets the Department of Enforcement Agency's (DEA) standard.

CAN NEEDLES OR INHALERS GO IN THE ENVELOPE?

Unfortunately, no. Please reach out to your local health department.

WILL ANYONE SEE MY PERSONAL INFORMATION? No, once you seal the TakeAway Envelope it is incinerated unopened.

WHAT ABOUT THE STUFF YOU DON'T SELL?

Bulk pick-up begins on Monday, April 7th, 2025. You can place your bulk items at the curb no sooner than Wednesday, April 2nd, 2025, and no later than Sunday, April 6th, 2025. Citywide bulk pick-up can take up to TWO WEEKS to complete.

WM WILL PASS BY YOUR RESIDENCE ONCE

Do not cover the sidewalk or water meter with your bulk items, and do not block your items by parking vehicles in front of them.

EXAMPLES OF BULK ITEMS:

Chairs, sofas, mattresses, tables, empty water heaters, lawn furniture, appliances with Freon® removed, carpet (cut into 4 foot bundles), Sinks, toilets, AND MORE!

NOT ACCEPTABLE:

Televisions, computer monitors, refrigerators, window units, portable A/C units or anything else that contains freon, tires, vehicles, and parts, gasoline, oil, and filters, batteries, glass, construction debris from a contractor, concrete, brick, asphalt, and roofing, hazardous materials, or waste.

BRUSH REQUIREMENTS:

- Branches and tree trimmings must be no greater than six inches (6") in diameter and be cut, tied, and bundled in four foot (4') lengths weighing no more than forty to fifty pounds (40-50 lbs.).
- Leaves and lawn clippings are allowable if bagged and remain within the total monthly limit of six (6) cubic yards.


EXTRA BAGS OF TRASH:

Yard Maintenance, Bulk Waste, and Junk Vehicles

As spring approaches, help keep Live Oak, clean and beautiful by maintaining your property. Grass and weeds must be kept under 12 inches tall. Tree branches should be trimmed to provide at least 8 feet of clearance above sidewalks and 13 feet 6 inches above streets. Grass clippings and yard debris must not be left in the street, as this can clog storm drains and create hazards.


Bulk waste may not be left anywhere visible in the street except during


scheduled collection times provided by the City's garbage disposal services. Additionally, junk motor vehicles with expired registration or that are inoperable are not allowed on properties where they are visible to the public. This includes tarped vehicles.

- Provide an exciting, interactive learning environment.





Live Oak is Celebrating 65 Years

Live Oak, Texas: A Legacy of Growth, Community, and Resilience


The Live Oak community has always cherished its history and traditions, celebrating the milestones that have shaped it into the thriving city it is today. As we mark the 65th anniversary of Live Oak, Texas, we honor the pioneers whose vision and determination laid the foundation for a community that continues to flourish.



Founding and Early Years

Live Oak's origins trace back to April 17, 1960, when a group of dedicated settlers, many of them farmers, began acquiring land and forming a collective vision for their future. These early settlers, known as "trailblazers," included families whose surnames remain part of the community today, such as Engleman, Riedel, Fey, Albrecht, Schumann, and Friesenhahn. With grit and perseverance, they worked to establish a town independent of the growing metropolis of San Antonio, ensuring their voices would be heard in local governance.

Determined to preserve their autonomy, the residents officially incorporated Live Oak as a city in 1960 with a population of just 316. Clarence Albrecht became the city's first mayor, holding initial city meetings in his backyard beneath a canopy of majestic Live Oak trees. With the assistance of attorney Walter F. Rudeloff, the




necessary incorporation requirements were met, and Live Oak was officially recognized by Bexar County and the State of Texas.

Following Clarence Albrecht's relocation in 1966, Elton Ottmar (Fritz) Friesenhahn succeeded him as mayor, guiding the city until 1972. Over the past 65 years, many dedicated leaders have served as mayors, shaping Live Oak into the dynamic city it is today. We celebrate all past and present mayors for their leadership to the Live Oak community.

Historical Moments & Early Businesses

Throughout its history, Live Oak has been home to iconic sites and businesses that contributed to its charm and character. One such landmark was Herman's Dance Hall & Bar, located near what is now Kobe Teppan & Sushi. It was a beloved gathering place where locals enjoyed live music and were entertained by Herman's daring highwire act.



Another significant venue was the Judson Four Drive-in, which opened in 1977 at Toepperwein and IH-35 North. Operated by Maurice Braha, an immigrant from Egypt, this drive-in offered high-quality picture projection and screened classic films, becoming a popular entertainment destination before closing in the early 1980s.

The property is now the campus for Methodist Hospital NE and associated medical services. The Methodist Healthcare campus continues to expand and provides premier medical services for the entire northeast region of Bexar County.





In the late 1950s and early 1960s, Pan Am Raceway was established by Edgar Bowles after overcoming legal challenges concerning noise ordinances. The track became a renowned racing venue, attracting future legends like A.J. Foyt. Later, business magnate Red McCombs acquired the property, further solidifying its place in Live Oak's history.

In 2023, the property was sold to Stotan Industries for a planned industrial park that began construction on four buildings in April 2024. The industrial park is now known as the Interchange at Live Oak and offers tenant space from 20,000 square feet to 146,016 square feet for office and warehouse tenants.

The Legend of the Donkey Lady


Among Live Oak's most unique stories is the legend of Dorothy "Doc" Anderson, affectionately known as the "Donkey Lady" or "Skunk Lady." Living in a modest home on O'Connor Road, Doc was an eccentric animal lover who raised pink donkeys, Appaloosa horses, and even rescued skunks. Some locals believe her story intertwined with other Texas folklore over time, yet those who knew her



personally recall a woman with a deep love for animals and a poignant love story with her husband, Oscar. Though she lived a reclusive life in later years, her legend endures in Live Oak's history.

Boysville: A Legacy of Care (1943-Present)

For decades, Boysville played a crucial role in Live Oak's development. Originally established in downtown San Antonio, the "Home with a Heart for Homeless Boys" relocated to Live Oak in 1953, where it provided a safe and nurturing



environment for children in crisis. The facility thrived under the leadership of Rev. Don Holiman and Marshall Crook, offering agricultural programs and welcoming famous guests like Hop-along Cassidy and Jimmy Dean.

Due to rising land prices, the Boysville campus moved to Converse in 1983. Today, it continues to support children with residential cottages, emergency care services, and educational programs, ensuring that its mission of breaking cycles of poverty and abuse lives on.

Looking Forward

From its humble beginnings as a farming settlement of 316 residents, Live Oak has grown into a vibrant city spanning 5.5 square miles with a population of 16,385. The city thrives with robust business districts, top-tier medical facilities, and outstanding public services, including law enforcement, sanitation, infrastructure, and recreational parks and programs.

Despite challenges over the decades, Live Oak has remained resilient thanks to the dedication of its city council, staff, and engaged residents. As we celebrate 65 years of progress, we look forward to a future filled with continued growth, community spirit, and countless new memories.

Cheers to many more years of celebrating the legacy of our original settlers and embracing the bright future ahead for the premier community to live, learn, work, and play!

Reminder from the City of Live Oak

Spring Wildlife Awareness

Spring is the prime birthing season for many types of wildlife, including deer. It's not uncommon to come across a fawn resting alone in the woods or tall grass within the City's park system. While it may seem abandoned, it's important to remember that in most cases, these young animals are not in distress and do not need human assistance.

If you encounter a fawn or other newborn wildlife:

- Keep your distance: Observe from afar and keep the encounter brief.
- Do not approach, touch or pick up the animal: This can do more harm than good.
- Let nature take its course: A fawn's best chance of survival is with its mother.

Fawns nurse just three to four times a day, and the mother typically stays away to avoid attracting predators. The fawn's natural camouflage, minimal scent, and ability to remain still help protect it from danger. If you believe a fawn is in immediate danger, maintain a safe distance to observe the situation and contact the Live Oak Animal Control Department at 210-653-1755 for guidance.

By respecting wildlife and their natural behaviors, we can help ensure their safety and well-being.

Clothes Dryers: A Hidden Fire Hazard

Did you know that the leading cause of home clothes dryer fires is failure to clean them? Follow these steps to keep your dryer safe:

- Clean the lint filter before or after every load of laundry. Don't forget to remove lint that may have collected around the drum.
- **Keep the dryer area clutter-free.** Store boxes, cleaning supplies, and clothing safely away from your dryer.

Smoke Alarms: Your First Line of Defense

Working smoke alarms can cut the risk of dying in a home fire by half. Here's how to ensure they're always ready to protect your family:

- Install smoke alarms inside every bedroom, outside each sleeping area, and on every level of your home including the basement.
- Test smoke alarms monthly by pressing the test button.
- Change batteries annually and replace them immediately if the alarm "chirps" to signal a low battery.

Cooking Safety: Focus on the Stovetop

Most home cooking fires involve the stovetop. Stay vigilant by following these precautions:

- Keep flammable items like oven mitts, wooden utensils, food packaging, towels, and curtains away from your stovetop.
- Stay in the kitchen while frying, grilling, or broiling food. Never leave cooking unattended.

Electrical Safety: Watch Those Cords

Fires caused by extension cords outnumber those from permanent or detachable power cords two to one. Protect your home with these tips:

- Inspect electrical cords to ensure they're not running under rugs or across doorways. Extension cords are designed for temporary use only.
- Upgrade your outlets. Have a licensed electrician install additional receptacle outlets to reduce reliance on extension cords.

Emergency Management

Preparing Makes Sense

After an emergency or severe weather event, you may need to rely on your own resources for several days. Being prepared involves having enough food, water, and essential supplies to sustain your household during that time. Creating a disaster supply kit ensures you have a ready collection of basic items your family may need in an emergency.

Ensure your emergency kit is fully stocked with the items listed on the Disaster Supplies Kit list before heading to the store. After gathering the essentials, think about your family's unique needs, such as supplies for pets, prescription medications, children, or senior family members. It's equally important to maintain your kit and store it properly. Make sure everyone in the household knows where the kit is located, as emergencies can happen unexpectedly, and you may not be at home when they occur.





Disaster Supplies Kit:

- Water (one gallon per person per day for several days, for drinking and sanitation)
- Non-perishable food items (supply to last several days)
- Battery-powered or hand crank radio and a NOAA weather radio with tone alert
- Flashlights
- First aid kit
- Extra batteries
- Whistle (to signal for help)
- Dust mask (to help filter contaminated air)
- Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties (personal sanitation)
- Cell phones with chargers and a backup battery
- Prescription medications
- Eyeglasses and contact lens solution
- Infant formula, bottles, diapers, and wipes
- Cash or traveler's checks

Being prepared makes sense. Make a plan for your household, including your pets, so that you and your family know what to do, where to go, and what you will need to protect yourself from an emergency or severe weather event.




TxDOT's I-35 NEX Update

The extensive documentation of every step in the creation of bridge support structures from soil testing and drilling data to the concrete mix and the composition of reinforcing steel would fill a website. Oh, wait! That's exactly what TxDOT is doing on the first phase of the I-35 NEX South project.


For the first time in TxDOT history, every process, date, and data point—from planning to completion—is being collected on a site accessible via a QR code on a bridge column. While accessing the information requires special software, its true value lies in the future. Years from now, a TxDOT crew unfamiliar with the project will be able to quickly retrieve a complete record, including when the structure was last painted, whether it has ever been damaged and repaired, and the exact specifications it was built to.



Maximizing Work Zones

The I-35 NEX project receives numerous questions each week regarding various aspects of the construction. One of the most frequently asked questions is why the construction areas are spread out instead of in one continuous line.

The simple answer is it's about having enough space to work safely. Construction began in the more open sections of the corridor, specifically around the area of the southbound I-35 frontage road and Pat Booker Road and south of the I-35/I-410 interchange. Most areas are congested with existing infrastructure and require long-term closures of ramps or lanes, which necessitates careful coordination to minimize the impact of these closures as much as possible. Furthermore, many areas require underground work, such as drainage installation and utility relocation, which must be



completed before the construction of structures can begin. These factors create physical constraints that prevent work from starting in those areas.

In an ideal scenario, having more space for safe work zones would allow TxDOT to start at one end and maintain continuity in production. However, the most effective approach for the I-35 NEX project is to work in all accessible areas first.
